this Jacob Hatch line, to keep it going in the family news.

Jacob Hatch, born 15 April 1773, Green Mountain, Add., Vermont, son of John Hatch and Annie Chalker; married 18 April 1809, Elizabeth or Betsy Wilde, daughter of Thomas Wilde and Annie Williams. She was born 1-7 January 1786, Williamsburg, Hamps., Mass. She died October 1847, Little Keg Creek, Iowa. Jacob Hatch died 9 Jan 1876 at Salem, Utah. Jacob had a second wife, Hannah Gailey.

Jacob and Elizabeth Hatch Children.

They were all born at Leroy, Jefferson, New York. Almira Hatch md. Alvah North. Eliza Hatch md. Abram Allen. Charlett Hatch md. Jonathan Allen Annie Hatch md. James Vanghan. Polly Hatch md. Samuel Swaner. Hosea Hatch (child). Hosea Hatch md. Hannah Garlick. Isaac Burrus Hatch, born 14 February 1823; md. Isaac Burras Hatch, born 14 February 1823; md. 10 September 1845, Lee County, Iowa, (1) Mary Jane Garlick. (2) Hannah Garlick. Layton Jacob Hatch, born 3 May 1826; md. Eliza Jane Hardy. William Henry Hatch, born 12 November 1828. Lewis Hatch, born 5-15 October 1832; md. Sarah Ann Jolly.

The following is a little information on Jacob Hatch:

Jacob's father was the owner of a large tract of land in the heart of New York City. When Jacob heard the gospel of Jesus Christ of the Latter-Day Saints, he believed and wanted to follow them. His being too old to go, they divided the land 5 ways, 4/5 to children and they kept 1/5 for themselves. They told them to go where they wished.

Jacob's children were all born in Leroy, Jefferson, New York. Jacob and family went to Palmyra, was baptized into the Mormon Church in 1832. He saw and suffered the persecution with the saints. He attended the funeral of the Prophet Joseph Smith. His wife Elizabeth, who was a graduate Doctor, was a great help among the sick. She was killed by a shot fired in the dark, when the mob was attacking their home. She died January 1839. The family came to Utah in 1849. In 1852 Jacob married Annie Gailey.

In searching records on Jacob, there is some need to check out the father and mother of Jacob Hatch. There seems to be a question. For years the Hatch Genealogy Records have showed what we have just given you. Some seem to think his parents names was Jacob Hatch and Agatha _____. If any of you can prove this, please send us the information and your source. If in due time, we don't hear from any of you, we will do research on this, to get it straightened out.

Eighth child of Jacob Hatch and Elizabeth Wilde. Isaac Burrus Hatch, born 14 February 1823, Leroy, Jefferson, Yew York, married 10 September 1845 Lee County, Iowa (1) Mary Jane Garlick. She was born 12 August 1822, at Providence, Bedfrd, Pa., the daughter of David Garlick and Elizabeth Buck. Mary Jane Garlick died 8 July 1900 at Koosharem, Sevier, Utah. Isaac Burrus Hatch died 28 March 1853 at big Cottonwood, Salt Lake, Utah. Isaac married (2) Hannah Garlick.

We will complete an article that was to be continued in this issue, from issue 2, September 1965, on Page 4, Column 1, concerning some of our first genealogy on the Hatch Organization.

In the Genealogy and History of the Hatch Family, many families were not reported fully, and some not at all. Our Society was not entirely at fault for the omissions, for hundreds of our letters of inquiry were never acknowledged.

"Mr. Charles Harold Briggs¹⁰ (Charles A Briggs⁹, Elvira Hatch⁸, daughter of James⁷, Asa⁶, Joseph⁵, Ichabod⁴, Joseph³, Jonathan², Thomas¹), of minneapolis, has has contributed largely to the information we have of descendants of his second gtreat grandfather, Asa Hatch, Spencer E. Smith⁹ (son of Sarah A Hatch⁸, Wait⁷, Lewis⁶, Wait⁵, Edward⁴, Samuel³, Jonathan², Thomas¹), of St. Paul, Minnesota, has been another kind friend, who deserves mention for the preparation of historical sketches of some of his ancestors, especially for that of Thomas¹ and Jonathan² and for the gift of the map of falmouth, the old home of this ancestor of ours. Frank D. Hatch⁹ (Charles B.⁸, Frank⁷, Joseph⁶, Joseph⁵, Joseph⁴, Josph³, Jonathan², Thomas¹), of West Hartford, Connecticut, assisted us in tracing his branch back to 1713, and supplied us with many addresses of kindred. One more dear friend must not be; forgotten, Mr Silas Alonzo Hatch⁸ (Joseph⁷, Nathanial⁶, Ebenezar⁵, Joseph⁴, Joseph³, Jonathan², Thomas¹), of Bloomington, Wisconsin, who has been aiding us since 1916, and though 88 years of age, has been the first to order two books, with a probable order of six more.

Space will not permit us to mention the many of true friends we have found who have spared no pains to aid us all they could. The sympathy and support they have given us through the long years of our tedious and oftentimes "trying experiences of seeking through the darkness of the past. a name, or perhaps a family, fast sinking into historical oblivion," has indeed been commendable. None but those who have taken a hand in this labor can appreciate the satisfaction felt by us as a result of the kindly words and generous help afforded by these, our friends."

On, December 28, 1896 members of the Hatch family met at the residence of Orin Hatch for the purpose of organizing a Society to be known as a Temple or Genealogical Society. This was apparently the beginning of the Ira Stearns Hatch family.

The following is a copy of the minutes on the meeting mentioned above:

"Woods Cross, Utah, Dee 28th, 1896-98

Members of the Hatch family met at the residence of Orin Hatch for the purpose of organizing a Society to be known as a Temple or Genealogical Society. Prayer was offered by Orin Hatch.

Orin P. Hatch explained the object of the meeting and gave his views why a Society of this kind should be organized.

The following persons expressed their views as favoring an organization; Ephraim Hatch, John A. Hatch, Reuben Hatch, John E. Hatch, Gilbert S. Hatch, Mrs. Jane Hatch, Alving W. Hatch, Orin Hatch. A Genealogical Society was formed with Orin Hatch as President, Stearns Hatch as General Secretary and Treasurer. Orin P. Hatch and John A. Hatch as assistants.

An adjournment was taken subject to call of the President. Prayer was offered by Ephraim Hatch."

Another statement in one of our old books, as follows: "Logan, Utah, Dec. 3, 1914.

On the above date, Orin P. Hatch, John E. Hatch of Woods Cross, Adeline H. Barber of Logan, Sophronia A. H. Tidwell of Smithfield, Alice Terrell Harris, Louisa H. Malcom of Ogden, L. L. Hatch of Franklin, Idaho with Ruth A. Hatch as Secty pro-tem met at home of R. A. Hatch and effected a central organization of the Hatch family for Genealogical purposes with those following officers: Stearns_Hatch of Woods Cross, President. L. L. Hatch of Franklin, Idaho, lst Vice Pres. Alice T. Harris of Ogden, 2nd Vice Pres. Orin P. Hatch of Woods Cross, Treas. and Sec. Elizabeth Hatch of Woods Cross and Ruth A. Hatch of Logan as Recorders.

Minutes of Hatch Genealogical Meeting: On Dec 3rd 1914 the following named persons net at the home of Ruth A. Hatch in Logan, Cache Co., Utah, and there effected a Hatch Surname organization.

It was then called a Parent Organization and was to include all other Societies of Hatch people who cared to unite with us.

Stearns Hatch of Woods Cross, Utah was elected Pres.

L. Layfaette Hatch of Franklin, Idaho, Vice Pres. Orin P. Hatch of Woods Cross, Utah, Sec and Treas. Ruth A. Hatch or Logan, Recorder or Genealogist. Lizzie Hatch of roods Cross, Utah, Asst. Recorder or Genealogist.

Alice M. Harris of Ogden, Utah an Aid.

Those present were: Adaline Hatch Barber of Logan. Orin P. Hatch of Woods Cross. John E. Hatch of Woods Cross. L. Layfaette Hatch of Franklin Idaho. Alice M. Harris of Ogden, Utah. Louisa H. Haalan of Ogden, Utah Ruth A. Hatch of Logan, Utah

Ruth A. Hatch Sec. pro tem."

In regards to the suggestions placed in the suggestion box, which was printed in September 1965 issue, this is what has been done so far.

- 1. President to be elected for two years term and Vice President to be considered as new President. This will be presented at our big April meeting when Officers are usually elected. Be there so you can voice your opinion or write us before April.
- 2. As to a large pedigree chart to be available for each one. It is in it's final stages now. We will tell you about it in the next issue, how it came about and how you can get one.
- 3. The books that have been published on Hatch line are in the Archives Library. Volume 1, has some information in it on the Ira Stearns Hatch line. The volumes are from 1 to 8, volume 7 and 8 are combined. Most of the information is on the Jeremiah line. I believe there are a few sets left, for sale. Write to Aura C, Hatch, 85 East 300 South, Provo, Utah. He also has printed copies, of the Lorenzo Hill Hatch Journal, for those who come from this line, (who is from the Jeremiah line.
- 4. We hope to make some names available to you as far as original research of our Hatch Genealogy goes. There are so many it would be impossible

to get all of them. Ruth Hatch Hale, at one time was our Genealogist. She went back East and went through many records for our research, also a great deal of correspondence was done. These old letters are in the possession of the Hatch Genealogy Society. I hope we can get this all microfilmed while I am President. We are trying to take these steps now so they will be available to you in the Library. We will see what we car do to make some kind of a list for you. If any of you know some of the names of the original researchers, please let us know.

History of Jacob Hatch

Jacob Hatch was born 15 April 1773, in Green Mountains, Vermont. He was the son of John Hatch and Annie Chalker. He married first Elizabeth Wilde, 1 Jan. 1786, at Hampton, Mass. She died about Oct. 1847, at Little Keg, Iowa. She was the daughter of Thomas Wilde and Annie Williams. He married the second time in 1852, Hannah Gailey, who was born in 1815, Lankshire, Eng. She died in Payson, Utah, in 1858.

While Jacob Hatch and his wife Elizabeth were living in Little Keg Creek, their house was surrounded by a mob at about 2 A.M. The mob was throwing stones through the windows, banging at the door and tearing at the roof of the house. Jacob prepared to fire at the mob telling his wife to get under the bad to escape the flying stones. She said, "Oh father, they might kill you," and at that moment must have rushed to the door to try to hold it. He fired through the door into the darkness not knowing but what she was under the bed. She groaned and fell. Upon discovering he had shot his wife he a ran over to his son Isacc's who lived a few rods away. He said, "Isaac I have killed your dear old mother." Isaac and his wife, Mary Jane accompanied him back to his cabin where they

found her lying on her back in a pool of blood. Mary Jane ran to the cabin in her bare feet, not taking time to dress them, and she splashed in the life's blood of her mother-in-law. This was about two months before her son, George Andrew Hatch was born. The bullet passed through Elizabeth's shoulder near the heart and right wrist, through the door, killing one of the mob, and embedding itself in the wagon box. The mob on finding one of their number killed picked him up and ran from the place. On 15 Sept. 1550, Jacob came to Utah by team with two of his sons and their families, settled in Salt Lake City, Utah. Then later moved to Payson, Utah. He joined the church about 1831. He worked on the Nauvoo Temple on one meal a day and went through the hardships that the Saints went through. He had given all his property to the church in early days, so that when he was aged was under the necessity of drawing from the general tithing office for his daily needs. He would walk from Payson to Salt Lake City to see Bishop Hunter about it when he was nearly 100 years old. He died 9 Jan. 1876, at Salem, Utah. He was buried in Payson, Utah. If he had lived three more months he would have been 103 years old.

Also the following just came in the mail.

Jacob Hatch and his second wife Hannah Gailey had one child, Ellen Hannah Hatch, born 1 Feb. 1853, in Salt Lake City, Utah; she md. George Washington Brown 1 May 1870, died 12 May 1891. Jacob's wife Hannah Gaily was born 1815, Lancaster, England; died 1858 at Payson, Utah Co., Utah. ****

married 7 June 1882, at St. George, Washington Co., Utah. She was born 24 March 1842, at Hardin



Tennessee, the daughter of Aser Pipkin nd Margaret Singleton Foster. Nancy died 28 July 1922, at Fruitland, San Juan, New Mexico, buried there also.
